First, I want to say that the present board, Dr. Schulze, the faculty and staff are doing an outstanding job. That said, there are significant challenges ahead for our schools. These are difficult economic times for everyone. We are faced with high unemployment, falling property values, rising taxes and government spending, and at least at the federal level, seemingly out of control. The message the voters are sending is "get the spending under control, and address the huge debts we are facing". Government at all levels needs to listen. Because of the recent spike in hospital taxes here, this will limit rev-

Gentry Fife Funeral Home, Junction, Texas, and Seizes

Related Prepaid Funeral Contract Records and Funds

On March 2, 2010, Texas Banking Commissioner Charles G. Cooper ordered that the permit held by Jeffrey Gentry dba Gentry Fife Funeral Home, Junction, Texas, be cancelled, and issued an Order to cease and desist all activities relating to the sale of prepaid funeral benefit contracts and seizure of all prepaid funeral contract records and funds. The Order recites that Gentry violated Chapter 154 of the Texas Finance Code by failing to maintain records and properly deposit money collected from the sale of a trust-funded contract. Under the Order, Gentry has been instructed to cease selling prepaid funeral benefit contracts and to cease collecting associated funds. Further, the Department seized Gentry's prepaid funer-

al records and related trust funds. The Order was effective immediately, but Gentry has requested a hearing to determine whether the Order should be stayed. That hearing is set for April 22, 2010, at the Texas Department of Banking office in Austin.

In accordance with Section 25.19 of Title 7 of the Texas Administrative Code, the Department is tasked with finding another funeral home to service the outstanding trust-funded contracts of purchasers who elect to keep their trust-funded contracts. The Department's goal is to protect the rights and interests of these trust-funded contract purchasers by transferring responsibility to perform the trust-funded contracts to a responsible successor selected by the Banking Commissioner of Texas.

Gentry also operates Gentry Funeral Home in Mason, Texas, and recently opened Gentry Funeral Home in Fort Stockton, Texas.



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



During the early stages of its work here, Blastco, the company that ultimately finished the project toward the end of 2009, threatened to sue TxDOT on several occasions. To date, the company has not filed a lawsuit, but has a full year (March, 2011) to make its decision. There is a process available to contractors who feel they have claims against TxDOT. Disgruntled contractors can take grievances before a series of TxDOT "claims panels" and then to an "administrative hearing" in an effort to sort out issues of disagreement. After these claims and appeals are exhausted, a lawsuit can be filed.


Texas Bridge Partners, the company that started the lead paint removal and repainting project on the bridge in January, 2006, was defaulted from the project in August, 2006, and temporarily lost its SSPC certification. The lawsuit resulting from that work was expected to go to court in March, according to Nowlin.

Another TxDOT project is about to start. The low water crossing known locally as "Flatrock Crossing" is being replaced by a higher bridge crossing. The closing for the construction of the off-again, on-again project is now scheduled to commence in May,

The design engineer on the project is Marshall Heap. The plans and right-of-way acquisitions have been in place since 2006. The construction project was tabled for lack of funding from TxDOT. Now, it seems, President Obama's "stimulus money" will provide the funding, but with one caveat. The project must commence as soon as the money is in place. At this time, that appears to be May, 2010. Heap said TxDOT had planned to try to avoid "kayak season" as much as possible, but will have to comply with the stimulus money mandates or risk losing the funding.

Acme Bridge, of New Braunfels, was awarded the contract to construct the new bridge. Heap said that weather is going to be an issue because of the extensive amount of concrete work involved. The curb and gutter work will be time-consuming, so Heap predicts that the project could possibly take as much as a year.

During the construction, Flatrock will not be open as a "takeout" for canoers, tubers and kayakers.



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




